## Rev. Michael Fischer

As much as I enjoy change, it always comes with a bit of a learning curve and challenges. It's been a whirlwind transition, but it has been great being downstairs with the kids on Sunday mornings and working with our amazing team of kids ministry volunteers.

#### **Halloween Parking Lot Party**

One of our big outreach events at CT is the Halloween Parking Lot Party. It's incredible to see so many people come together to pull off a fun event like this in our community. This year was a lot colder than last year, so we had to make some quick last minute changes. Who knew that bouncy castles need to run in temperatures above zero?? Even with the cold temperatures, we saw upwards of 750 people come through the parking lot and many unfamiliar faces. It's great to put on a fun event, and I love that this became an open door for people to see the church as a safe and welcoming place for their families and a place that loves without expectation. It takes a lot of volunteers to pull off an event like the Halloween Parking Lot Party from the youth to adults to seniors, I'm so grateful for everyone who stepped up to help, whether it was in donating candy, helping with the food, directing people where to go, even the set-up and clean-up was so efficient! I especially want to highlight the incredible team of over 25 of the youth we had helping to run the games in the parking lot. They were so enthusiastic and were champs in the cold!

#### **Sunday CT Kids**

This fall has seen many new faces at CT Kids - kids, parents, and leaders. Throughout the months of September to December, we saw an average of 85 people at CT Kids from Nursery through Grade 5, including leaders. It has been incredible to see new families getting connected as they return week after week.

We've discovered, through Moses, that God teaches us how to lead, and how to follow God as He leads us to safety and to what we need. We explored the Israelites journey in the book of Exodus and how we can choose to be thankful, to love God and others, to turn to God when we're lost, to go to God when we need rest, and to remember God's promises. We learned some important lessons from Joshua about how obstacles are no problem for God and courage comes from knowing God's words. Finally, we looked at the way God had been planning things from the very beginning, we saw how God sent Jesus for a reason, and learned to trust God's timing.

I'm excited to be part of what God is doing here at CT through our kids. It's been exciting to see the growth of new families on Sunday mornings, and in the few short months I've been on staff, I've met so many new parents and kids that are making CT their home. I am so grateful to be able to step into this role and being able to build on the foundation that was set by the leaders and pastors of CT Kids before me. It is so exciting to see God at work in the hearts and lives of our kids and how they can have an impact in their worlds at school, in their communities and in their families.

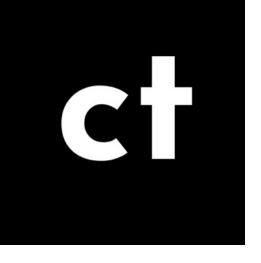
#### CT IS A HORIZON COLLEGE CHURCH HUB.

## 2023 AGM Minutes

## Calvary Temple Brandon Annual General Meeting April 23, 2023

Meeting took place at Calvary Temple. 63 members present (72% of the membership roster)
Pastor Michael Fischer, Chairman of the Board, called to order the Annual Business Meeting at 1:32pm.

#### Agenda items:

- Devotional: Pastor Michael led off the meeting with prayer. He encouraged the church to keep missions at the forefront, reaching out to the community around us and beyond as well. May we the church be steadfast in our mission to love others and in our love of God.
- 2. **Establishment of voting bar:** The first two rows of tables in the sanctuary are for voting members; all other tables are for non-members. Establishment of the voting bar was moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Brenda Kilmury. CARRIED.
  - The quorum report of 63 members present (72% of the membership roster) was moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Lori Noordenbos. CARRIED
- 3. **Business meeting appointments:** Pastor Michael appointed Lynda Robar as Scrutineer, Lynda Robar and Dan Cowell as ballot distributors, and Lesli Onyshko and Lindsay Metruk as recording secretaries. Appointments were *moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Sean White. CARRIED.*
- 4. Welcome to new members: Dan Cowell, Leanne Cowell, Ruth Denboer, Gerry Denboer, Elissa Teichrib, Greg O'Gilvie, Karen O'Gilvie, Lynn White, and Adam Whelpton were all added to the membership of Calvary Temple since the last membership roster was presented. Pastor Gary Jennings prayed over the new members.
- 5. **Membership roster**: 87 members are on the current roster. Pastor Michael expressed thanks to the Board for the work they have done in contacting people on the membership roster over the past year to confirm their memberships post-COVID. Current membership roster as presented was moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Doug Lawrence. CARRIED.
- 6. **Acceptance of previous AGM minutes:** Minutes from the 2022 AGM were *moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Brad Heuchert. CARRIED.*
- 7. **Reports:** A motion was made to accept the pastoral reports as written by Michael Fischer, Charles Rempel, Nikki Ragush, Amberley Fischer, and Karen O'Gilvie. *Moved by Pastor Michael Fischer, seconded by Hannah Seitter. CARRIED*.
  - Before a verbal report from two ministry areas, Pastor Michael discussed two questions that were submitted in advance with regards to:

- 1. A noted staffing increase for 2023 Pastor Michael noted that there is nothing to report officially at this time other than to say that there will be some upcoming staffing changes and shuffles within the year.
- Updates to the front of the building in regard to mobility and access for all Pastor Michael noted that there is nothing to report officially at this time other than to say there are ideas being discussed at the Board level and that this remains a priority.

A verbal Student Ministries update was given by Pastor Nikki Ragush. A question was raised by Brenda Kilmury after the report: "Is there a college and career group at the church for continuation of students that graduated and move on from the youth group programming?". Pastor Michael reported that there are multiple groups that are open for young adults (YA) such as Varsity Christian Fellowship (VCF) and various small groups, including a YA focused small group.

A verbal Operations update was given by Pastor Charles Rempel.

- 8. Election of board members: Ballots were distributed and members voted for the appointment of 3 board members out of a total of 8 members who allowed their names to stand. Votes were counted. Returning to the board are Brad Heuchert and Jeff Yaciuk; being welcomed to the board is Bob Turnbull. The voting results were moved by Pastor Michael Fischer and seconded by Lynn White. CARRIED.
- 9. **Trustees of Calvary Temple:** Wayne Phillips and Lynda Robar are the acting trustees of the church.
- 10. Financial Report: The report was given by Lesli Onyshko in place of Trista White who could not be in attendance. General contributions increased over the course of 2022 such that it offset the loss of income provided in the previous year by government wage subsidies during COVID pandemic. The financial report as presented was moved by Pastor Michael Fischer and seconded by Jeff Noordenbos. CARRIED.
- 11. **Adjournment:** Meeting was adjourned at 2:21pm. *Moved by Pastor Michael Fischer and seconded by Topasannah Heuchert. CARRIED.*

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#### INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

#### To the directors of Calvary Temple

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Calvary Temple that comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2023, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

#### **Basis for Qualified Conclusion**

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Calvary Temple derives revenue from cash donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to us obtaining evidence we considered necessary for the purpose of the review. Accordingly, the evidence obtained of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization. Therefore, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments might have been found necessary with respect to donation revenue, excess of revenue over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2023 and December 31, 2022, current assets as at December 31, 2023 and 2022, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2023 and 2022 year ends. Our conclusion on the financial statements as at and for the year ended December 31, 2022 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

#### **Qualified Conclusion**

Based on our review, except for the possible effects of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Conclusion paragraph, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the accompanying financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Calvary Temple as at December 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the period ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### 1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Calvary Temple is an unincorporated registered charity; registered as a not-for-profit organization and thus is exempt from income taxes and may issue income tax receipts to donors. The purpose of the organization is to provide Christian religious services and programs to the residents of Brandon and the surrounding area.

#### 2. CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING POLICY

During the year the organization commenced recording of the amortization of capital assets on the statement of operations. The change in accounting policy has been applied retrospectively in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

#### 3. RESTATEMENT OF NET ASSETS

Restatement of net assets results from a change in accounting policy. The effects of this change have been reflected in the accounts retrospectively. The effect of the change in policy on the statement of operations resulted in the organization recording amortization expense during the year of \$53,221 (2022 - \$49,619) and accumulated amortization of \$1,486,792 for the years prior to 2022. The net assets and net book value of the capital assets have decreased by \$1,589,630 (2022 - \$1,536,411).

#### 4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of presentation

The financial statements of the organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### **Financial instruments**

Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and liabilities are at amortized cost unless otherwise noted. Financial assets and liabilities measured at amortized cost consist of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable, and long-term debt.

It is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest rate, liquidity or market risks arising from these financial instruments, unless otherwise noted.

Notes to the Unaudited Financial Statements For the year ended December 31, 2023

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivlents include balances with banks and term deposits with maturities of three months or less.

#### Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are being amortized on the straight line basis at the following rates based on estimated useful life, except in the year of acquisition, when one-half of the rate is used:

Computer hardware 3 years
Furniture and fixtures 5 years
Automotive equipment 10 years
Buildings 25 years

The organization reviews capital assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

#### Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Unrestricted contributions, ministries, missions, and other revenues are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recognized. Revenue related to rental properties are recognized as revenue of the Rental Properties Fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

#### Fund accounting

The Church maintains three funds: Operating Fund, Capital Fund, and Rental Properties Fund.

The Operating Fund reports the revenue and epxenses related to general operations of the Organization.

The Capital Fund reports the capital assets of the Organization and present the flow of funds related to their acquisition and disposals including any applicable debt.

The Rental Properties Fund reports the Church's revenue and expenses related to rental properties operations.

#### Contributed services and materials

A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair market value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Contributed materials which are used in the normal course of the organization's operations and would otherwise have been purchased are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution if fair value can be reasonably estimated.

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements, as well as reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty, and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

This amount represents a loan made to the Pastor to assist in the purchase of a home. The loan is non-interest bearing and is payable at the time the Pastor leaves the Church.

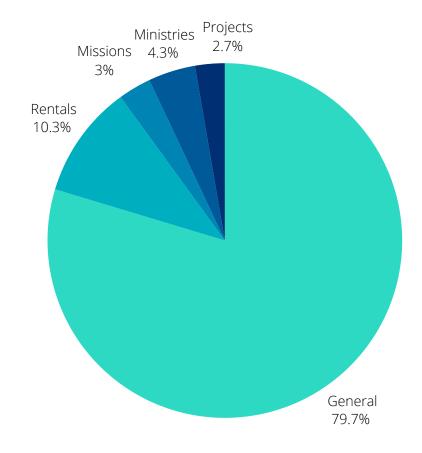

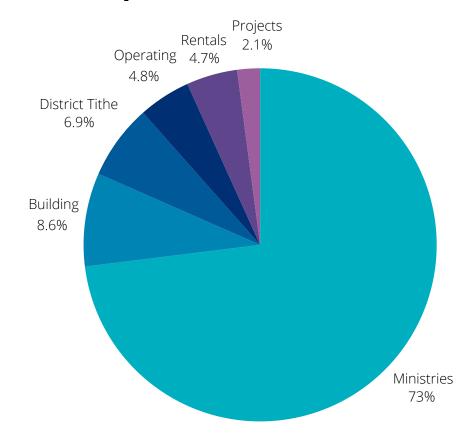
